  - j) Return any oversized PFD to the race official tent.
  - k) Be prepared and available to assist the race officials to move the boat, steady the boat, hold the boat, carry the boat, clean the boat, etc.
  - I) Help clean the boats and equipment at the end of the last race.
  - m) Bring refreshments to the race officials and boat attendants.
  - n) Congratulate the other teams on a race well done. Safety first!
  - Good sportsmanship. Leave the competition on the water and develop friendships on the beach. Once the race ends, dragon boat paddlers are one community; comprised of family and friends and supporters of all water/ocean-related activities.
  - p) Have fun and be respectful.
  - q) Encourage and help increase the Dragon Boat participation and support; volunteer, financial and grass roots invitation!
  - r) A loud and appreciative "mahalo" to the race officials and volunteers.
